Sanii Vora can be a handful for his opponents because not only of his rapid strokeplay and resources of stamina but also because of his obstructions and aggressive courtcraft.

But that didnt work against the stalwart Manish Chotrani. Chotrani raised his game and lost just one set to claim the title in the Bombay Gymkhana Maharashtra State Open Squash Championship.

Chotrani had beaten Sahil in the **Western India** final earlier. Memory of that no doubt spurred him to triumph at 9-3, 6-9, 9-4, 9-2 to pocket a purse of Rs 50,000 at the ABG Shipyard-sponsored event.

In the women's category, Joshna Chinappa of Tamil Nadu thrashed local lass Depapil Anvekar 9-5, 9-6, 9-1 to be richer by Rs 20, 000. Vora committed many unforced errors in the first game and with Chotrani playing sale, the early exchanges went in favour of the older player. Vora's powerful forehand drives won him the second game but that was as far as he could go. Manish kept the ball in play and that worked against an over-excited opponent, 14 years younger than he.

Vora had won the first two and then lost three in the CCI meeting.

Sadly it was the younger player who ran out of steam in a battle of players 14 years apart. Manish Chotrani, 33, was pitted against 19-year-old Sahil Vora who has claimed most of the country's junior titles.

But after doing all the early running, the CCI youngsters appeared to have shot his bolt. He faded away in the final stanza being blanked in the last two by one who knows what it is to be the country's numero

Chotrani, who was making a comeback after injury, won 7-9, 9-1, 5-9, 9-0, 9-0 in the Rs. 3 lakh prize money event, co-sponsored by Lifebuoy.

Mekhala Subedar, made her last event before gher wedding a winning one by beating Alisha Mashruwala 9-0, 9-0, 9-4 in the final. Alisha, however, had something to show on her home courts when claiming the under-19 and 15 titles.

RETURNS REAPED FROM RETURNING MACHINE By Pradeep Vijayakar

Count on Mumbai to make the most of the modern tools. On September 7, 2003, The Indian Squash Professionals took a step into the future when unveiling this little squash ball shooter – the Boaster Mark 111 in Mumbai. By January nearly a dozen clubs and hotels had got a taste of it and made good use of it.

A portable squash practicing machine, this contraption can shoot upto 48 balls at speeds varying from 31 m/sec at intervals that can be varied between one second to eight seconds.

It was procured from Yorkshire-based JMD Technologies for a whopping Rs.1.6 lakh (including duty). The machine can make the job of the coach a lot easier. A player can now work on bettering a shot now that the shooter can send balls to a particular corner of the court consistently, something that the coach could'nt have possibly done over a period of time.

When in Pakistan at the invitation of the late President Zia to watch the First Asian Squash Championships in Karachi in 1981, one watched awestruck how the Pakistan coach Omar Daraz would feed squash champion Jahangir Khan wilt 200 overheads at a time in on go. First 200 forehand overheads then 200 backhand overheads. Little wonder that Jahangir, then barely 18, went on to become a legend in his lifetime with two years of unbeaten play. Since man is not perfect, a machine to take a load off his back was bound to come. And it makes one proud that Mumbai city took the lead. Mumbai which boasts of the country's major national champs. The beauty of it is that the one who donated the money for this contraption, has remained anonymous.

In the words of professional Chandrakant Pawar ``This machine will definitely take care of the coach's routine work. Coaches can now concentrate on a fine-tuning a player's skills. Beginners can really benifit from this machine and improve their strokes." The

slowest speed, at about 13 m/sec, can be comparable to a 11-yearold's strokes while the fastest (31 m/sec) can be likened to that of a men's National champion. The shooting frequency can be

regulated from intervals of one second to eight seconds.

The machine weighs about 26 kg is portable and can be easily

The machine weighs about 26 kg is portable and can be easily dismantled. The ISP's plan was to loan the machine for ten days each to every squash clubs in Mumbai and to finally instal it at the Squash Racquets Association of Maharashtra (SRAM) courts at the Andher Sports Complex.

As many as nine clubs and hotels made use of the machine between Cotober and January .. They were: The Leela ; Khar Gymkhana 4-5 days;Willingdon Sports Club Oct 18-27; Chembur Gymkhana Oct 29-Nov 7; The Resort Nov 9-18; C.C.I. Nov 18-30; Bombay Gymkhana Nov 1-10; Juhu Gymkhana Dec 10-20 and Jindal Complex Dec 25-Jan 3.

Know Your Stars... Anil Nayar

Sports week 01-05-1977

I TOOK up the game of squash in 1958 in Cathedral High School, Bombay at the age of 12. I was very fortunate to have the legendary Yousuf Khan as my coach and under him my agility, fitness and stroke play developed and I was able to move into top

I created a sensation in 1964 by becoming the first person ever to win the junior and senior titles simultaneously at the Western India championships which are virtually a dress rehearsal of the Nationals.

The following year was one of the best of my career as I won the National men's and juniors' titles convincingly and then went on to become the lone Indian ever to win the Drysdale Cup, considered to be the world junior championships.

The same year I had to leave India for higher studies at Harvard. American squash is a modified version of the English game which is played in India. However, I adapted myself to the hard ball and the modifications to win the American National title twice and the

In between my services were required for India in the inaugural World Cup competition in Australia, A strained muscle hampered me in the championships, but I did create a fine impression, though I could not go far, I was rated as a fine young player in the world then. Unfortunately, my staying in the USA prevented me from regularly playing the English game and that was the reason I was unable to reach to the top of the international ladder. My finest moment came when I received the Arjuna Award from the

Since my return to India in 1971, I have dominated the Indian squash scene as no other player has done, Winning the National crown has become a habit with me. In the last six years I have lost only two matches.

SECRET: The secret of my success silky smooth action, lightning reflexes, superb wrist work and deceptive strokes. A squash player must cultivate all these points if he hopes to make it to the top. If you want to play attacking squash, you must pick the ball as soon as possible. This will ensure that you are not comered at the back of the court. Speed and fitness are the two important factors

Two years ago I took up the honorary secretary's post of the Squash Rackets Association of India to get the game moving. This is a very difficult task. But my business keeps me busy throughout the year and in a way has affected my game to a certain extent. For the same reasons, I could not accompany the Indian team to Pakistan and England in early 1976. But I helped the four players selected for the tours in their training programme in Bombay.

I am always available if youngsters want to train with me. In fact, Nikhillesh Senapati, Soli Colah, Anant Nayak and Gajendar Singh have been training with me for some years now, They are all promising the first two have already represented India and should serve India for years to come. I have no plans for retiring in immediate future. I would like to go on for a few more years.
